#### Hagia Sophia

Hagia Sofia, is a former Orthodox patriarchal basilica, later a mosque and now a museum in Istanbul Turkey. It was dedicated in 360AD and opened as a museum in 1935. I captured this image, not from the front which is commonly seen, but from the back which showed the various additions and which was kissed by the wonderful afternoon light. My camera was set to ISO 200, 1/200 of a sec, f11, and my lens choice was a short zoom of 38mm.



## **2nd PLACE Ruth Ann Rule**

#### Magnificent

The Arcade Mall in downtown Cleveland, Ohio,was erected in 1890. This was the first indoor shopping mall in the USA. It is a Victorian-era structure with a glass skylight spanning over 300 feet, along the four balconies. The natural lighting was excellent. Settings: ISO 200, Shutter Speed 1/180 of a sec.

Travelling on a bus tour I only had my Fuji Point & Shoot camera.

I bracketed 3 shots hand held and then processed the shots using HDR software which allowed me to keep the sky.

A few things to remember; consider the weather before you plan a fall photography outing. Autumn weather can be damp and cold, which can cause a few problems with a camera, so



be prepared. A cloudy day can leave the colours lacking brightness & vibrancy, but shooting near sunrise or sunset will make the colours jump out in your image.

Northern climates will see the colours reach their peek much earlier than the south so plan your trip accordingly.

Oranges, yellows, reds, and browns are the reason to shoot fall photos, but green can add to your image and make a good backdrop. The club members captured some excellent closeup photos of individual leaves,

#### Get Low & Move Slow

On January 18th **Mark Helm** shared his techniques on Macro Photography and how to stack your images. His passion is to discover the world around him, even if it is a few feet from his back door.

Focus stacking can be used to increase the available depth of field in a shot. You need a subject which is not moving while taking the photos. Mark takes his pictures in the early morning when the insects are still, due to the cold. During the morning

dew and after a rain fall are excellent times to capture macro shots too.

# Black and White Photography is back!

Black & white photography is one of the oldest forms of taking pictures.



January 4th - John Novak

In the last few years black & white has made a remarkable comeback.

John Novak a WCC member and owner of John Novak Photography & Printing in Brantford spoke to the WCC members on how to create outstanding black & white photographs from a digital camera and how to get the feel of black and white to print those amazing images.

He explained how shooting in raw form works best, but a jpg will work also. Some cameras do not allow you to shoot in RAW, but if your camera does allow it give it a go. You might be surprised by what you can do. Shooting in jpg doesn't stop you making black and white images. You can shoot in colour and do your conversion to black and white later on your computer.

While most digital cameras offer you the option to shoot in B&W, you will have more control over your end results if you have the colour data to work with in your conversion on your computer. In addition your image may work as both a black and white and colour so don't commit to incamera black & white especially if you are shooting in jpg.

There are a number of programs that you can use to convert colour to black & white. Adobe Lightroom, Adobe Photoshop and Photoshop Elements along with Apple's iPhoto & Aperture are some examples.

John explained that taking your pictures in black and white mode, using "convert to grey scale" is not recommended. A pdf copy of his presentation with recommended approaches along with reference articles and videos were provided for the clubs


