
Now let's get on with the Year end Results!



I was given this little job to provide some comments, so here goes. What to say?

A relative was visiting from England and when I went over to see him I discovered his rental car in the driveway still running. He thought he had turned it off because it was so quiet. Who has time to read an owner's manual in the middle of a 3600 mile trip?

Then I wondered, who takes the time to occasionally read the camera owner's manual? Three reasons people do not increase their camera skills are that they never take the time to explore the abilities and potential of their cameras, they don't always have their camera with them and they are too shy to slow down and take a good look around themselves - they might look weird checking out different perspectives and angles in order to get a good nicture

Can't take a camera everywhere? What about your phone? Tom Vogel, one of our guest speakers last year talked about using an iPhone. His Facebook page has some excellent pictures taken with his phone. Taking pictures with your phone can definitely improve your photography. Mine is a very basic point and shoot with a low pixel count. Therefore there is not much room for post manipulation. What you take is what you get. That means I have to take my time in preparation and consider composition, lighting and distractions. When I use a camera with adjustments I try to remember the same considerations.

What has this to do with communications? You can only say so much while relaying messages to club members so I wanted to share with you something that some will find useful.




