You can experience some smaller animals and babies up-close and will get an explanation on how certain animals change as they grow, their natural habitats, and why they are important to that habitat. Snowy Owl Irruption





Snowy Owls breed in the summer in the high arctic and each winter some migrate south to the Great Lakes region. However in an irruptive year, like this winter, they migrate as far as Texas and Florida. Some owls that have been captured and tagged seem to hunt in a one mile radius, whereas others set up a territory of a one hundred mile radius.

Club members Richard and Sharron Skevington have shown many people where to find the owls locally. So much so, that the Hickson-Bright Corridor has turned into a tourism "hot spot" for Oxford County! If you turn north in Bright and then turn west on Township road 12 heading back to Ratho, there are also good chances to see owls there. Check out the tops of silos, telephone poles, and isolated trees. On a good day up to 5 Snowy Owls have been spotted, and if you are really lucky you might find some close to the road.

Other spectacular sightings in that area recently have been a Rough-Legged Hawk feeding on a rabbit and an immature Bald Eagle feeding on a rabbit.

If you are north of Tavistock, take Perth County road #33 west into Stratford. On several occasions two "snowies" have been spotted there by Woodstock Camera Club members.

There is not much time left this year, so get out as soon as possible. Don't miss a great photo-op!

This year's Gala theme is "High Key". High-key lighting simply refers to images that are mostly bright, with a range of light tones and whites and not very many blacks or mid-tones. In high-key photography, tones that generally would be mid-range become much brighter, near-white tones become white and white becomes, well, white. This style of lighting was originally developed for films and television, back when the technology wasn't very good at capturing high contrast ratios. Today high key is purely an artistic decision - photographers and filmmakers choose it when they want an image or story to be upbeat, optimistic or youthful. You will find sample images on the WCC website, or go to Google-type-High Key - Images. Members are allowed to enter one (1) print each for a chance to win a prize. Your entry must conform to the guidelines for all of our regular contests (found in the Club Handbook). Please put your name and the title of your image on the back of the mounting board. Voting will take place at the beginning of the Gala.

So mark your calendar for your GALA. Wednesday, May 28th, 2014 at 6:00 pm.

We then flew to Hue in central Vietnam and photographed along the Perfume River and then in the Forbidden City. We then traveled to Hoi An, where we met a local photographer that took our group into a remote village. We had some great opportunities taking photos of the locals and the farmers working in the rice fields. It was a great experience and we made many new friends.

We then spent several days in Ho Chi Minh City formerly known as Siagon and the Mekong Delta. We experienced the busy floating markets and the famous Chinese market in Ho Chi Minh City. One evening the group went out for a four hour evening Vespa city tour. During our bike tour we ate at a few of the local restaurants and then met some of the locals as we wrapped up the evening visiting a couple of jazz clubs. Deadline for your image is April 16, 2014.






Hello all, The club year is fast approaching its end.

He then flew for me and landed further along the fence line, waiting for me to catch up for some more close shots. A late sun was lighting him from the front with its warm glow, and making a great winter's day even better.

So in choosing whether to vote for preparation, patience, equipment, or subject knowledge as being instrumental in successful nature photography, I can't help thinking about my "lucky" owl. I can't wait for those Swans and the changes they will bring.
